#### **Objectives:**

This workshop will introduce participants to the <u>FLLITE Project</u>, sponsored by CERCLL (University of Arizona) and COERLL (University of Texas at Austin). FLLITE takes the creative moments found in everyday language use as the basis for lessons in second language literacy. By emphasizing language play as central to communication, FLLITE lessons aim to develop language awareness as well as communicative abilities through the integration of speaking, reading, listening, and writing tasks.

In this workshop you will...

- become familiar with concepts central to the FLLITE approach and apply them to sample texts (including texts from your curriculum) in the practice of "reading for teaching";
- reflect on typical structures of FLLITE lessons, ways of scaffolding student exploration of the literary in the everyday, and strategies for integrating FLLITE into existing curricula;
- learn about working with OERs, the idea of an OER Lifecycle, and how FLLITE integrates this in professional learning;
- apply FLLITE concepts and pedagogical approaches in the creation of a lesson for your own curriculum;
- offer and receive peer feedback on your lessons, working with the FLLITE editorial checklist.
